# About Us



## Illinois Farm to School Network (IFSN)

The <u>Illinois Farm to School Network (IFSN)</u> is a growing coalition of organizations, school districts, early care providers, and individuals who support food and nutrition education, local food purchasing, and building our local food economy. Farm to School is a people-powered movement that seeks to strengthen the connection communities have with fresh, healthy food and local food producers.

#### Three Elements of Farm to School

- Local Food Procurement: Local foods purchased, promoted, and served in cafeterias
- Food and Nutrition Education: Students are able to participate in educational activities related to agriculture, food, health, or nutrition
- **School Gardens**: Students are able to engage in hands-on learning through gardening.



# Farm to School empowers children and their families to make informed food choices while strengthening the local economy and contributing to vibrant communities.

Children are provided with access to nutritious local food and the ability to learn how to grow it. Farmers, fishers, ranchers, food processors and food manufacturers are provided significant financial opportunity through Farm to School by opening the doors to a billion-dollar institutional market. This is important in the face of increasing globalization and corporate consolidation in agribusiness with agriculture workers losing out on potential markets. By supporting these local agriculture workers, Farm to School creates new jobs, strengthens the local economy and creates a solution to the crisis facing small farms. By offering this new market to farmers everywhere there's an opportunity for connections to be made with the next generation of consumers to eat locally grown food. From students, teachers and administrators to parents and farmers; Farm to School creates opportunities for everyone to win by building family and community engagement.

<u>Illinois Great Apple Crunch</u> is a celebration of local food, and of course, apples.

Crunching into local apples on Apple Crunch day, which is always the second Thursday in October, can become a yearly event at your school, or program site. You can purchase local apples for your celebration in a number of ways. Celebrations can be held in the cafeteria, outside in a garden or lawn space, or in the classroom.





Our website offers all the tools you need for a successful event; from registration to a variety of educational activities as well as ways to celebrate and share your event. We encourage participants to include educational enrichment activities on that day to promote the knowledge of where food comes from and healthy eating habits.

It's a free and flexible way to buy, grow, and serve more local food while teaching students about healthy eating, nutrition, and agriculture! Illinois Harvest of the Month helps school districts, feeding sites, and early care centers source and celebrate seasonal, local food.

#### Sow and Grow

Sow and Grow curriculum educates **elementary**-aged children about various plants and their parts, how plants grow, where our food comes from, and what is required to grow a healthy plant. Each nutrition lesson of Sow and Grow is comprised of objectives and goals. These are aligned with Common Core Standards as well as Next Generation Science Standards.

#### **Topics covered:**

- school gardens
- plant life cycles
- crop harvesting and seasonality
- weeds
- · bugs and insects
- the importance of soil
- how to compost

#### **Roots and Fruits**

Roots and Fruits curriculum, designed for **3rd through 5th grade**, can be adapted for younger ages. A combination of classroom curriculum, school gardens, organic farm tours, school lunch reform, and whole school wellness strategies create a positive impact on children's diets with the consumption of fruits and vegetables.

Linking Plants and Food curriculum for **5th to 8th grade** students instills a deep understanding of a sustainable food system and uses the local environment as a focal point for learning. Incorporating place-based education, Linking Plants and Food creates a meaningful and culturally relevant framework for learning. Assessments in this curriculum present opportunities for students to make collaborative decisions that affect the classroom community and incorporate student voices.
